Police Board, HRC Plan Meeting

The Board of Police Commissioners voted last night to hold a joint meeting with a group from the Human Relations Commission, April 13, at Police Headquarters. The meeting is designed to set up "more efficient and effective communication" between the two commissions for better community relations. Rev. Martin P. Kelly, liaison officer from HRC, who attended last night's police commission meetings, said. Fr. Kelly presented the

proposal for the joint meeting which was voted unanimously after brief questioning. Commissioner David A. Duncan, 3d, asked if the meeting would in any way duplicate the meeting called by Mayor Freedman to bring members of the black community and city officials and other representatives together. The mayor's meeting will not be held until the Mrs. Ruth Loving case is settled in courts. Fr. Kelly answered the joint meeting would only lay the ground-

work for coordinating the efforts of both commissions. In other action, Leonard K. Lockley, representing the Northern Education Service, asked the commission to outline the complaint procedure against a police officer. Commission chairman Theodore Trudeau said an individual may make a written report at police headquarters or write the commission directly giving the details of the incident. All available information on the case would be gathered, he said.

"If the commission feels there is a justifiable complaint, then it will call a hearing to listen to the officers involved," Trudeau said. If the commission recommends that charges be made against the officer, then the officer has the right to appeal to the Civil Service court, Trudeau said.

Planning Board Vetoes 2 Bids For Zone Change

The Planning Board voted to down two proposed zone changes Wednesday, but allowed one to pass. Two of the proposals came before a public hearing. The third petition was a continuance from March 4.

The board voted against a petition to amend the ordinance changing 14 Northampton Ave. and 15-17 Wilbraham Ave. from Residence B to Business B to allow for the construction of a carwash.

Atty. Frederick Burns, representing the petitioner, Schwarz Brothers, Inc., outlined proposed plans for the construction of an automotive equipment testing area adjacent to an existing garage, and the construction of a car wash.

Among five residents who registered opposition with the board was Dr. William F. Hall, a dentist who resides at 106 Wilbraham Rd. and a representative of the Model Cities precinct that covers the area in question.

He said the proposal was against the planning program of the Model Cities board, and that an increase in traffic would be too heavy a load for already-busy Wilbraham Road.

Board members also turned down a zone change petition on the south side of Tinkham Road, approximately 51 feet from the Wilbraham town line.

ADA Realty Trust Co., developers, were seeking to have the zone changed from residence A to residence C-1, to allow for the construction of garden apartments.

The board voted the plans for a 176-unit apartment complex of 22 buildings was "ill-conceived," leaving too many questions unanswered.

This was the second time ADA Realty had petitioned the board for the zone change. On March 4, the board postponed a decision so the planner could submit more advanced plans.

Receiving approval of the Planning Board was to change 151 Allen St. from residence B and industrial A to Residence C, allowing Robert Langford of East Longmeadow, owner of the

property, to construct a 22-unit, two and one-half story apartment house. He submitted preliminary plans to the board, and a petition signed by 13 area residents saying they were not opposed to the construction of an apartment house.

There is presently a two-story house, owned by Langford, on the property.

Special Session For Grand Jury Set April 13

The Hampden County Grand Jury will hold a special session starting April 13, Dist. Atty. Matthew J. Ryan, Jr., said Wednesday.

Ryan said the 23-member secret body will convene at his request to meet the demands of a heavy load of pending criminal matters. He said there is an extremely large number of persons in the York Street Jail who have been bound over from District Court. Court officials estimate 80 persons are presently in jail, awaiting trial.

Ryan could not say for certain if trials would begin during April on cases returned by the special Grand Jury. The Grand Jury normally sits the first week of January, May and September.
